According to Shiga, "The morning wew of Mt. Daisen at the end of the second half of the naval uncertainty and seen myself twenty-four years earlier. I sure whether I would be able to render fore writing the scene. . . . Fortunately en previously appeared vividly in my mind, probably because the impression it made on me was so strong. I was pleased that I was able to completely describe my feelings. "54 Shiga's capability to remember and describe his experiences of twenty-three years before is amazing. 55 But did Shiga really see what he described?

### THE ROLE OF IMAGINATION IN DESCRIPTION

It is commonly believed that Shiga faithfully described what he saw on the mountain. However, I believe that there are fictional elements in this description, which may tell us more about the main character's state of mind than the actual scenery. Let us examine the following passage.

But there was no sign of activity yet in the villages immediately below, which lay still and dark in the shadow of Daisen. Kensaku then saw for the first time the sharply delineated outline of this shadow in the distance as it retreated from the bay and crept toward him over land, allowing the town of Yonago to emerge in the light. It was like a great dragnet being pulled in; or it was like the caressing shadow of a passing cloud. And so Kensaku watched with emotion this rare sight—the shadow of the proud mountain, the greatest in central Japan, etched boldly across the land. (p. 402)

The expression of "a great dragnet being pulled in" certainly reminds the reader of the Izumo mythology of pulling islands toward the mainland by the god Yatsuka Mizuomitsunu no Mikoto 人東水區津野命, who used Mt. Sanbe 三瓶山 and Mt. Daisen to anchor the pulling ropes. Shiga's description can also make the reader wonder whether the mythology itself was inspired by the shadows of the two mountains in ancient times.

However, Shiga's description was questioned by local people of the Daisen region, who think that the mountain shadow cannot possibly reach the "bay" and pass over Yonago 来子 during summertime when Shiga visited the mountain; it could only be viewed in winter. My research suggests that Shiga's description is partially based on his imagination. My two trips to Mt. Daisen on 26 July and 3 August 2012 confirm that the sun rose about 5:11 a.m. and the mountain shadow appeared at 5:32 a.m. when the sun reached a certain height. The shadow only reached the top of Mt. Hatsuka 母塚山, about eighteen kilometers west of Daisen, not as far as the Nakanoumi 中海 bay, nor the city of Yonago. Then, as the sun continued to rise and the compass point moved toward the southeast, the shadow gradually decreased in length. It took four minutes for the shadow to move four kilometers away from Mt. Hatsuka due southeast. Then it took another forty-seven minutes to move seven kilometers away (see figure 3.3).

In sum, the short length of the shadow and its slow movement lack the dynamism of "a great dragnet being pulled."
